Other tracks, both barefoot and moccasined have appeared and many are still present. Some are ~~in~~ in the river bed and usually under water while others are ~~it~~ will above the water level on flat rock ledges. I examined a number of these on the McFall farm on 2-1-69 and again on 2-18-69. On route 205, 4.2 miles west of its intersection with U.S.-67, there is a fork in the black top road. Here the river flows close ~~to~~ ^{from} the ^{mouth side of} road on the ~~mouth side~~. Here on the south bank, on a ledge about 3 feet above water level is a series of 11 large tracks over a 50 foot span, giving ten strides an average ~~of~~ 5 feet each. The longest was about 6'-9", but precise measurements are impossible because the depressions are gradual at the edges with no sharp point of demarcation. Several of these tracks were cleared of mud and loam using water freely and a whisk broom ^{to get down to} solid rock. Print number 1 was chosen for a plaster cast because it ~~was~~ was exposed
