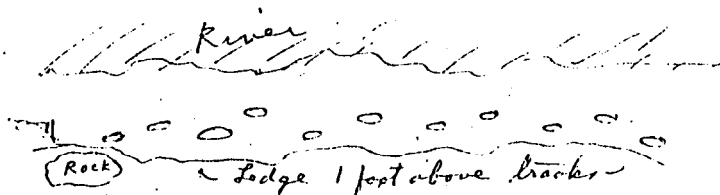

in August 1968, ~~at which~~
when Dr. Burdick, utilizing
a bulldozer and a load-
lifter, turned over, at this ^{point}
a slab of rock that measured
66" x 120" x 12 inches.

This ~~newly~~ ^{track} was 14 inches
from the broken shelf and
some 15 ft from the water's edge, and
perhaps 80 feet from our ~~truck~~ car parked
at the roadside. This print was made by
the right foot, presumably on a moccasin shoe.
The ~~stride~~ ^{stride} was 70 inches, the foot 66.
The feet were some 16" apart as he walked.



The mud was soft or the individual very
heavy, or both, because the depression was
4 or more inches deep, 18" long and 8" wide
at the instep. If one ^{had} put a moccasin on
the foot that made the ~~best~~ tracks found
elsewhere, it could have made a track
entirely compatible with the one under
discussion.
